Congratulations to all our award recipients on Presentation Day.

2022 has been a very good year at BHPS and today we had the opportunity to reflect upon the outstanding achievements that our students have experienced. This year, we were really able to return to 'business as usual' in many ways, with an absolute focus on teaching, learning and wellbeing.

We had a high level of representation in sport at zone and regional level. This year, we had students represent BHPS at state level in cross country and athletics. Our PSSA teams represented us on a weekly basis, demonstrating skill, sportsmanship and teamwork. Our Senior A and Junior C netball teams and our senior girls and junior boys touch football teams were successful in winning their competitions. We are awaiting the results for girls T ball and boys softball who are close to taking out their competitions as well.

This year we extended our student leadership program, with explicit leadership training for our Year 5 and 6 students, and all students in Year 6 having the opportunity to hold a leadership position and offer BHPS their initiatives. Our peer support program complemented this as our students participated in student led wellbeing programs. Year 6 leaders, in combination with our SRC have coordinated lunchtime activities, recycling collections and gardening just to name a few activities.

A safe learning environment is essential for our students to achieve the success that they deserve. I would like to thank the leaders, teachers and support staff at BHPS for making sure every child is known, valued and cared for. Thank you to our wonderful classroom teachers who work tirelessly caring for the learning and wellbeing of every child in their class. Thank you to our support teachers, who provide special programs that encourage a love of literature in the library, a love of music, dance and drama through our creative and practical arts program, specialist support for our students for whom English is a second language or who need some extra help in there learning. HOW DOES IT WORK? Students are encouraged to purchase wristbands via Flexischools (available now) for \$10 each. The wristbands are a pass to participate in ten activities. All ordered wristbands will be provided to the students on the day. When a student goes to an activity, the Stage 3 leader will mark one tally mark on the wrist band. Once ten tallies have been marked onto the wristband, the wristband will be removed as it is no longer needed. If students have additional wristbands they will continue to use them until all applicable tallies are marked.

Throughout the duration of the event students roam the school with their friends engaging in the activities of their choice. They can attend all activities as many times as they choose however, each turn costs 1 tally. It is a great, fun filled day!

COMMON QUESTIONS:

DO ALL ACTIVITIES 'COST' THE SAME? Yes. All activities cost one tally mark (equivalent to \$1). In previous years we have allocated different values to each activity however, this is a much easier system for participants to navigate.

WHO LEADS THE ACTIVITIES? All Stage 3 (years 5 & 6) students. Stage 3 students have been working hard to plan and coordinate their activities.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE? All students from K - 6

WHY ARE WE USING PREPAID WRISTBANDS? In previous years students have pre-purchased tokens to 'spend' at the activities. Each activity was a different value meaning a sausage sizzle cost 3 tokens and a visit to the haunted house cost 2 tokens. Many students experienced difficulties budgeting out their tokens which resulted in missed opportunities. This year we have decided to trial the wristbands and have all activities cost one point in an attempt to increase the fun opportunities for all.

DO PARENTS ATTEND? Unfortunately this is a student only fun day.

CAN PARTICIPANTS PURCHASE MORE THAN ONE WRISTBAND? Absolutely! One wristband equates to ten turns at the activities. The more wristbands students have, the more activities they will participate in. Please remember that if students would like a sausage sizzle they will need to make sure they have one point on their wrist band saved for it.

IS THE SAUSAGE SIZZLE FREE? No. The sausage sizzle 'costs' one tally mark (equivalent to \$1) and must be included in the students wristband allocation if they would like to have one. There will be a variety of options including beef, chicken, vegetarian and halal sausages as well as regular and gluten free bread. The sausage sizzle is available throughout the fun fair session.

CAN STUDENTS BRING THEIR OWN RECESS & LUNCH? Yes. If students would prefer to eat their own recess and lunch during the fun fair time they are welcome to. Otherwise there is a sausage sizzle, cupcakes, biscuits, spider drinks and ice creams available to enjoy using tallies on their wristband.

Ethics Classes at Beaumont Hills Public School

Dear parents and carers,

Are you interested in your child attending ethics classes?

In ethics lessons, students explore everyday issues suitable for their age. They learn to listen closely to each other, to disagree without putdowns and to think carefully as they form their opinions. Classes are free and are run by specially trained Primary Ethics volunteers, who are often parents and grandparents. Classes run in the SRE/SEE timeslot each week – Wednesday 9.30 am at our school. (Year 4 2023 only)

Ethics is for children of all faiths or no faith. The curriculum is prepared by Primary Ethics (a not-for-profit organisation which organizes volunteers who teach ethics in NSW public schools) and approved by the Department of Education.

Primary Ethics will help us set up an ethics program in our school if there is enough interest from families and there are enough volunteers available. Ethics classes are capped at 22 students and any students that exceed this number will be placed on a waitlist until a volunteer becomes available.

Ethics teachers present stories and questions that encourage children to think about what they would do – and what they ought to do – in that situation. The volunteer teachers use fully scripted lesson plans – they don't give their own opinions – to help the children develop their own ideas and discuss the issues amongst themselves.

Ethics explores topics like:

- Is it important to own up when you make a mistake?
- Is it ever okay to be lazy?
- · Are there times when acting in your own self-interest doesn't count as being selfish?
- Should voting be compulsory?

Please return the slip to the office if you are interested in your child attending ethics classes.

Primary Ethics always needs more volunteer ethics teachers so that all parents at our school can have the option of choosing ethics classes for their child. It's only about an hour a week and you don't need any past teaching experience. You will receive free, comprehensive training with online self-pace learning plus trainer-led workshops (by Zoom or face-to-face).

Help our children develop skills for life

What does it mean to be brave? Is it ever ok to break a promise?



We don't have the answers to these questions. In an ethics class we let the children discuss questions such as the ones above and form their own views through respectful discussion with their peers.

Ethics classes support children to develop the skills they need to voice their opinions, consider the ideas of others and to make decisions based on evidence and reasoning rather than habit or peer pressure.

Ethics classes are facilitated by impartial ethics teachers who are trained to deliver our Dept approved curriculum.

Volunteers are needed now to teach ethics at Beaumont Hills PS. Classes run for 30 mins at the same time as scripture each week. Full training and scripts are provided and you only need about an hour a week.

What is Special Religious Education?

SRE is education provided to students in NSW public schools by authorised representatives of approved religious groups to students who have nominated that religion. These classes are commonly known as "scripture".

What is Islamic Special Religious Education?

Carrying the noble Islamic tradition of seeking knowledge and teaching, ISRE is an educational program dedicated to providing Islamic education to Muslim students in NSW Public Schools. ISRE is a project offered through the Islamic Council of NSW (ICNSW) and has been running since the early 1980's. ICNSW is an approved Special Religious Education provider with the Department of Education and Communities.

What is the Islamic Special Religious Education program?

The ISRE lessons provide a specifically tailored Islamic education program for Muslim students. The program is designed to teach Muslim students the basics of Islam, nurture them to develop a strong sense of identity and purpose and inspire them to lead productive lives by contributing positively to themselves, their communities, their society and the world. The ISRE program is non-sectarian and is provided to all Muslims students, regardless of their sectarian groupings. The aim of ISRE is to teach students to love, learn and live Islam.
